URGENT FUNDING REQUEST: FIREFIGHTERS FOR PATIENTS RESCUE VEHICLE: \$145,000



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1. Executive Snapshot: Why Act Now

This is an urgent appeal to fund a specialized response vehicle that will serve as a lifeline for families with special needs members during crises. We are Rescue 7 Firefighters for Patients, and we go where standard emergency services cannot.

- **The Problem**: When disaster strikes, standard first responders are not equipped for the complex needs of our most vulnerable. They lack the specialized training to manage hidden medical crises or evacuate individuals with severe mobility challenges, often leaving families with special needs members stranded and without hope.
- Our Unique Solution: We are the only task force of its kind, a team of certified first responders who are also caregivers for special needs family members. This dual expertise, combining 60+ years of professional skill with lived experience, allows us to safely manage complex medical and behavioral needs that others can't.
- **The Funding Need**: We are seeking **\$145,000** to purchase and modify a single, mission-critical 4x4 response vehicle. This includes a heavy-duty truck chassis (\$95,000) and essential life-saving modifications like a powerchair lift system (\$50,000).
- Your Immediate Impact: Your contribution directly ensures that when a terrified family calls for help, we have the right equipment to say, "Yes, we are coming to help." It allows us to reach them, evacuate them safely, and prevent a crisis from becoming a tragedy.

2. A Story of a Rescue: When Every Second Counts for a Family in Need of physical support

The phone rang with the desperation I've come to know all too well. It was a family trapped by rising floodwaters in Tennessee. The power was out, their home was an island, and their loved one, entirely dependent on a 300-pound powerchair, was stranded on the second floor. The chair's battery was critically low; soon, he would be completely immobile in an active disaster zone. They had called for help, but no one was coming. They had lost all hope.

This is the call we exist to answer.

My name is Luke Rosen, and I am a Founding Partner of Rescue 7 Firefighters for Patients. When my team and I arrived, the reality of the situation was even worse than described. The yard was a muddy, knee-deep swamp. Our vehicle—a borrowed family SUV—was utterly useless. We had to leave it behind.

The most challenging moment came when my fellow first responder and I faced the powerchair itself. Getting it to safety was non-negotiable. We hoisted its immense weight, the metal frame digging into our shoulders, and began the grueling trek through the cold, murky water. Every step was a struggle against the mud that threatened to pull us down. With each foot forward, one thought dominated my mind: "If we had the right truck with a lift, we could have secured this person in minutes. Instead, we're risking everything just to move a piece of essential equipment. Thankfully because our own daughter uses a power chair, I was able to remove non essential pieces and adjust the harness to make the individual as comfortable as possible, while staying secure and safe."

We were physically exhausted, but we succeeded. When we finally got the chair to dry land, the family was in tears. They couldn't believe we had gone to such lengths for them.

This rescue was a success, but it exposed a critical failure. We reached one family, but our inadequate equipment meant we were slower, less effective, and put our own team at risk. With a proper vehicle, we could have helped twice as many families that day. This story is not just about one family; it's about the countless others we are not reaching fast enough.

3. The Problem: A Critical Gap in Emergency Response for Special Needs Populations

When disaster strikes, the systems designed to protect us—local fire, police, and even federal agencies like FEMA—often fail our most vulnerable citizens. The hard truth is that standard emergency response is built for a population that doesn't exist: one without cognitive challenges, mobility limitations, or complex medical dependencies. This creates a dangerous and often tragic gap for families with special needs members.

The failure isn't one of intent; it's a failure of connection and specialized training. First responders are taught to manage a disaster scene, but they are not equipped to see the **hidden medical crises** within it. They may not recognize the silent panic of a non-verbal child, the profound disorientation of a person with Alzheimer's "sundowning" in a chaotic shelter, or the subtle signs of distress in an individual with a rare disease. This lack of understanding leads to devastating outcomes:

- Families are told "we can't help you." The logistics of evacuating a 300-pound powerchair or navigating the behavioral needs of someone with autism are deemed too complex or time-consuming in a crisis. This leaves families with an impossible choice: abandon their loved one or attempt a dangerous self-evacuation.
- Patients are left behind or separated from caregivers. During the chaos, individuals with special needs are frequently separated from the very people who can communicate their needs, leading to extreme distress and potential medical emergencies. Without a familiar caregiver, a person with dementia may wander and become lost, or a person with epilepsy may miss a critical dose of medication.
- The psychological trauma is immense. For a caregiver, hearing that help is not coming from the very people sworn to protect them is a profound betrayal that leads to a deep sense of isolation and hopelessness.

This is not a new or isolated problem. The systemic nature of this failure is well-documented:

Crisis & Population	Impact
Hurricane Katrina	A disproportionate number of fatalities occurred among the elderly and disabled. In Louisiana, 71% of the deceased were over 60.
National Preparedness	A 2019 government report found that 75% of individuals with disabilities felt their local emergency plans did not fully account for them.
Ongoing Risk	Over 6 million Americans live with Alzheimer's, many concentrated in disaster-prone states like Florida and Texas.

The current system is designed to rescue people from a flood, a fire, or a storm. It is not designed to rescue a person whose medical and emotional needs make them uniquely vulnerable *within* that disaster. That is the critical gap where families are abandoned. And that is the gap we fill.

4. Our Solution: Specialized, Empathetic First Responders

4.1 Who We Are: A Unique Blend of Professional Skill and Personal Experience

We are not just first responders; we are parents and caregivers. We are **Rescue 7 Firefighters for Patients**, and our **Special Needs Task Force** is the only one of its kind in the world. Our team's strength comes from a rare fusion of over **60 years of combined professional experience** and the deeply personal, lived reality of caring for family members with special needs.

This dual expertise is our defining characteristic. We are certified first responders, but we are also the parents who know firsthand the silent panic of a child with sensory issues or the urgent need for a specific medication that cannot be missed. We see what standard emergency services don't because we live it every day. Our guiding value is simple and absolute: "No Family Left Behind." We refuse to accept that a person's medical needs make them "too complicated" to rescue.

Our unique capabilities include:

- **Specialized Training:** Our members hold certifications in **crisis intervention and specialized patient handling**. We are trained in communication techniques for non-verbal individuals, allowing us to build trust where others cannot.
- **Deep Empathy in Action:** We know how to apply calming pressure to soothe a terrified teen with Angelman syndrome because we have children with similar sensory needs. When we find a patient separated from their caregiver, our first instinct is to look for the hidden emergency protocol letter that could prevent a life-threatening seizure—a lesson learned from our own families' experiences.
- **Navigating the Unseen:** We understand the nuances of conditions like dementia and autism. We know what "sundowning" looks like in a chaotic environment and how to compassionately engage a person who is "wandering." We know that a tremor isn't just a symptom; it's a challenge to holding on, and we know how to secure that person safely because we do it for our own children.

Most rescue teams are trained to get people out of a disaster zone. We are trained to get a person with epilepsy, who has just missed a dose of medication and is separated from their caregiver, to safety **and** to the pharmacy. This is not just a job for us. It is our community, and we are uniquely equipped to protect it.

4.2 What We Do: Targeted Support for Patients Requiring Heavy Medical Equipment, Movement Disorders, Dementia, Autism, and Rare Diseases

Our mission is precise and urgent: we deploy to disaster zones to find and rescue the individuals who are invisible to traditional response efforts. Our work is not random; it is a targeted, three-phase operation designed to provide comprehensive support for families managing dementia, autism, and rare diseases.

1. Pre-Deployment Strategy: Proactive Intelligence

Before a storm makes landfall, our work has already begun. We proactively contact local officials and disability advocacy groups to obtain lists of known at-risk residential addresses and group homes. This intelligence allows us to map out priority zones and anticipate the specific needs of the community, turning a reactive crisis into a strategic, prepared response.

2. On-Site Intervention: Specialized Rescue Protocols

This is where our unique blend of skill and experience becomes a lifeline. We execute specialized evacuations tailored to the individual's needs, using protocols that standard teams are not equipped to perform.

Scenario	Our Specialized Action	Why It Matters
A non-verbal autistic teenager in sensory overload	We deploy weighted blankets and noise-canceling headphones from our go-kit to create a calm, secure environment.	This de-escalates a high- stress situation, preventing the need for physical restraint and allowing for safe, compassionate transport.
A child with a rare mitochondrial disease on a ventilator	We rig portable battery packs to their essential medical devices, like ventilators and feeding pumps.	This ensures uninterrupted power during a hours-long evacuation, preventing a life-threatening medical emergency.
An individual with severe tremors and spasticity	We use flexible stretchers and gentle strapping techniques learned from our personal caregiving experience.	This secures the person safely and comfortably, preventing injury and accommodating physical conditions that make standard evacuations dangerous.
A woman with Alzheimer's who has wandered from a shelter	We use a calm, non- threatening approach, avoiding sirens. We build rapport by talking about familiar things—like her cat—to gently guide her back.	This avoids escalating agitation and fear, establishing the trust needed to lead a disoriented person to safety.

In every rescue, our first step is to locate the patient's "go-bag"—the vital kit containing medications, documents, and comfort items—because we know from experience that it is a lifeline.

3. Post-Rescue Support: Ensuring Continuity of Care

Our mission does not end once an individual is evacuated. We provide continuous, compassionate support until they are stable and reunited with their support system.

- **Safe Transport & Logistics:** We transport families and their heavy medical equipment, like powerchairs, to designated safe locations, whether a shelter or a relative's home.
- **Medical Advocacy:** We ensure patients have an immediate supply of their essential medications, even if it means navigating flooded roads to reach a pharmacy.
- **Compassionate Liaison:** We stay by the side of a non-verbal patient, acting as their voice to communicate critical needs to shelter staff or other responders until their caregiver is located.

Our process is a continuous loop: we gather intel, perform a specialized rescue, provide follow-up care, and then use the lessons from that deployment to refine our intelligence for the next. This ensures we are not just responding to crises, but are constantly improving our ability to protect our most vulnerable community members.
